

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SOCK KNITTING FOR BEGINNERS & BEYOND by Sarah Bass

The weather may be changing by the time you read this and, even if it's not, summer will soon fade away leaving warm, happy memories. Your toes, however, can't use memories to keep them warm as the temperatures drop well below their comfort zone. This is where hand knit, wool socks come in handy. Hand knit socks are custom tailored to your feet and legs and provide a level of warmth and comfort not available in mass-produced socks, regardless of their expense. (OK, \$500 pure cashmere socks really should be this nice, but I'm not sure that they actually are.) So, come join us as we learn/brush up/ expand our sock-making skills just in time to keep our feet cozy as the mercury drops.

The \$70 cost of this class includes your own, personalized, sock kit. Each kit includes:

- Yarn hand dyed just for you Merino /Nylon blend
- Fingering weight for those wanting to use smaller needles (US 2)
- DK weight for those wanting to use larger needles (US 4 or 5)
- Needles appropriate for the wool size there will be a variety of sizes so you can attain a proper gauge. Remember that you can never have too many needles!
- · A pattern with detailed instructions for socks in both yarns
- A list or other fun, free sock patterns to be found online

SPECIFICS ABOUT THIS CLASS:

- This is not a beginning knitting class. All students must already know how to: • Cast on, knit, purl, increase, decrease, follow a pattern
- Skills that you will learn or review in conjunction with sock knitting techniques:
- \circ Magic loop knitting, stretchy cast ons, kitchener stitch for grafting
- One, two* hour class per week for four weeks (*the first class will be three hours to accommodate gauge sample knitting)
- Because of the nature of hand dyed yarn, **registration must be received at least one week before the first class date.** After that, there will be a selection of yarn on hand for late registrants
- When registering please specify:
- what size yarn you would like larger or smaller
- what color(s) yarn you would like to work with for this project
- If you would also leave your email address or Ravelry name I will be able to get in touch with you with any questions I might have and other things that we may need to know ahead of time.
- Material fees can be paid during the first class.
- Feel free to bring your own needles and pay just \$65 class fee.
- At this time, I cannot accommodate those needing a fiber other than wool.
- Classes are Tuesdays: 10/25 from 6 9 pm; 11/1, 11/8 & 11/15 from 6:30 8:30 pm.

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ACWC WELCOMES PILAR MCKAY AS ASSOCIATE DIRECTOR OF MARKETING AND DEVELOPMENT

Pilar McKay joins the Arts Council for Wyoming County as the Associate Director of Marketing and Development. As part of this position, Pilar will be working on public relations, engaging millennials with the ACWC, and supporting staff with existing and future programming.

Pilar started her work with the Arts Council for Wyoming County in 1999 as the first student board member for the organization. "I was on the board during a rebranding process, and it served as an introduction to what would become my career in communication and marketing." As a student in Perry Central Schools, Pilar played the cello and attended the ACWC Chamber Music Camp that was hosted at Letchworth Central Schools during the late 1990s. Another memorable alum of the ACWC Chamber Music Camp was professional musician Ddendyl Hoyt.

After attending college at Cornell University, Pilar moved to Los Angeles where she attended graduate school (UCLA) and worked in advertising. Her work in rural arts started once she returned to upstate New York. Josh Rice approached her to start a Shakespeare Festival at Silver Lake. "I grew up with Josh and respected his work in theatre. I immediately said 'yes' to my first rural arts project." Shake on the Lake is the result of this collaboration and has grown in five seasons into a touring company that is looking to expand its season's calendar.

Being involved in Shake on the Lake has lead to other rural arts opportunities. Pilar founded Rural Arts Weekly, a twitterbased communication network where rural arts advocates and artists come together to talk about issues important to them. Through this work and Shake on the Lake, she has become involved in the Art of the Rural's Next Gen Rural project that focuses on engaging artists, organizations, and advocates in creative placemaking.

"I like to describe creative placemaking as turning spaces into places through the arts. This is certainly something Shake on the Lake has done with the support and collaboration with the Arts Council for Wyoming County," Pilar says.

Pilar adds: "In my role with the ACWC, I would like to see ways that other people can start their own arts projects in the county."

The Oscar-winning film, *The Apartment*, set in the Mad Men-era corporate world, will be screened in the Classic Film Series on September 15, in a program that begins at 7 pm.

Directed by Billy Wilder, this bittersweet romantic comedy concerns a lonely office clerk (Jack Lemmon) who begins to climb the corporate ladder when he lends his conveniently located apartment as a rendezvous point for executives; but things get complicated when he falls for the latest girlfriend (Shirley MacLaine) of his philandering boss (Fred MacMurray).

Variety's review praised *The Apartment* as being filled "with touches that spring only from talented, imaginative filmmakers." This superb film went on to win five Oscars, including Best Picture, Director, Screenplay, Film Editing, and Art Direction-Set Decoration. It was later named to the American Film Institute's Greatest Films list and the Library of Congress' National Film Registry.

ACWC GRANTS AND SCHOLARSHIPS FOR YOUNG ARTISTS

APPLICATION DEADLINE: December 31, 2016. The ACWC is now accepting applications for the following three grants:

Balus Grant for High School Students in Grades 10-12

This scholarship is made possible through the Balus Foundation and is awarded once each year to one or two high school students who wish to further their studies in the performing arts. The grant (up to \$500) may be used to help with summer music camp fees or ongoing lessons from a professional teacher or institution. Recipients of this scholarship are expected to perform at select ACWC events throughout the year, including the DEC Awards event that is held in March. The award is also presented at that time.

To apply for this grant, applicants must submit by email to hoyt@artswyco.org:

- A brief statement addressing your reason for submitting the grant application
- A biography (one page maximum)
- A digital photo of you with your instrument or performing (at least 300 DPI jpg)
- A letter of reference or support from your current or past music teacher
- An acceptance letter into the program in which you wish to participate or a copy of the program's application form
- All information except photos must be submitted as a PDF or MS WORD document or plain text in the email. (Please do not send in Google Docs.)
- The applicant must live in Wyoming County.
- Application is open to any student attending public, private or home school.

Rising Star Scholarship

The ACWC Rising Star Scholarship is awarded annually to a current junior, senior, recently graduated college student or young artist up to age 30, who plans to produce and sell visual art as part of their future livelihood. The scholarship includes a free booth space at the Letchworth Arts and Crafts Show, publicity, and a solo exhibition at the ACWC's Main Gallery. NOTE: This award does not have a Wyoming County residency requirement.

To apply, applicants must submit the following by email to hoyt@artswyco.org:

- A brief statement addressing your reason for submitting the grant application
- An artist's statement
- A brief biography (one page maximum)
- A photo (at least 300 DPI jpg)
- A few images (up to 10) of current/past work

Applicants will also be required to participate in an interview which would include a portfolio/craft review.

ACWC & Creekside Fabrics Visual Arts Scholarship

This scholarship is for high school students in grades 9 - 12 and is made possible through a partnership between the ACWC and Creekside Fabrics of Arcade. It is awarded each year to one high school student who wishes to further his or her studies in visual arts: photography, fiber arts, ceramics, carpentry, drawing or painting.

Valued at \$500, the scholarship will take the form of a one year apprenticeship to a local master in fine arts or crafts, culminating with an exhibition of work produced under the master. The recipient of this scholarship would work with the master to learn techniques and skills to improve their knowledge and competence in the select field of discipline. - · A letter of reference or support from a current or past teacher





WOOLGATHERING.... by Kathryn Hollinger

My friend Sue recently told me about cleaning out the bluebird boxes next to her sheep meadow for fall: "I thought I'd clean out all the old nesting materials for the winter, so the boxes could air out and be ready for spring. When I opened them up, they were packed with wool and two little black eyes were peering out at me. I told the mice they could spend the winter, but they had to be out by spring. Who could destroy a little home all made of wool?"

Indeed. Which made me ponder the old fashioned activities of woolgathering and its counterpart, gleaning. Woolgathering is walking along fence and hedge rows collecting bits of wool left behind by sheep. It is often an activity for the very young and very old, who would have more time to collect wool along these little byways. It is sometimes a bit derogatory, meaning, "indulging in wandering fancies and purposeless thinking." But, don't we need both kinds of wool gathering - taking all the little bits and pieces left behind to make something cozy or maybe using our imaginations just to exercise them?

Gleaning is collecting the very last bits of usable food left along the edges of a field. It is an activity reserved for the very poor. Most of us have seen Millet's The Gleaners (pictured at lower right). My husband tells the story of his grandfather walking along the railroad tracks and gathering the pieces of coal dropped by trains. He would carry them home to heat their house during the Depression. After a picnic on the beach, my cousin made sure we left our deposit containers where people who needed the money could collect them. The traditional meaning of the word is practiced around here today, after the big equipment has harvested the potatoes, beets and beans from large farm fields. Often now, gleaning means finding the essence of an idea; the kernel of truth, by sifting through many ideas or copious information. Interesting how the word has changed to something so strong from something reserved for the meek.

As the days shorten, we do start thinking about tucking up inside and putting by our harvests. We hope for the squash to harden off and for a few more tomatoes. The knitting that seemed untouchable in 90 degree weather calls to us, and the bag of wool by the wheel grows smaller. Also, we start to woolgather and glean. Perhaps we start to imagine a family gathering. Perhaps we think of starting something new. Perhaps we lie down and look at the clouds and let our minds empty. Maybe we empty that junk drawer and find the one thing worth saving. Maybe we empty an emotional "junk drawer," or we find a little treasure on the edge of something: a seed pod, a wild cucumber, a piece of beach glass — something to tide us through the winter, that staves off hunger and cold, whatever that feels like to each of us.

Quilting Stories Project

Quilts, or more specifically, their stories, are the subject of a new project we're undertaking at GLOW Traditions in the next few months. Quilting has a long history rooted in a utilitarian function to meet a need with available (and often limited) resources. The same is true of numerous folk arts traditions through which we reach beyond simple utility to add our own creativity, imagination and beauty to ordinary items like a blanket or a chair; or pass on our way of life through holiday celebrations, favorite recipes, old time music, family stories...the list goes on.

Quilts, in particular, seem to have incorporated distinct stories, evident through the tradition's documented and unwritten records. Many are literally sewn into the fabric itself, comprised of worn shirts and outgrown dresses. Others use new fabrics but are specially made for life events like graduations, weddings, and birthdays. Still more may be a commemorative piece, using clothing, images and photos of a loved one who has passed on. Again, these are only a few examples of how quilts can reveal cherished relationships and shared histories.

I'm interested in hearing your stories and seeing their creative counterparts. We would like to gather them together to create a traveling exhibit in 2016-17, to be featured in our GLOW region's arts councils' galleries.
